

From the President

This issue starts a series of articles to be continued in subsequent issues to bring the members information on the Regional Officers, activities, and future plans. The Regions provide the body and strength of NAPS as they are closer to the members. The founding fathers envisioned a strong regional structure to work directly with the local council religious relation groups and churches to encourage Scouting in the Presbyterian Church. This would include helping to start new units, and working with the Religious Emblems Display (R.E.D.) Team to foster the PRAY Religious Awards program.



The national officers meet with BSA National in Irving and PCUSA General Assembly staff to consider ideas, issues, and programs for Scouting. We are also able to gather information on new developments and provide to the Regional Officers and members. A good example: For the past six months, I have been working on making available to the members the "BSA Today" newsletter. The National Office is still reviewing the request. The BSA Today is published every two months by the National Religious Relations Group Office and contains plans and ideas by the many religious groups and new or changes to policies by BSA National. I think you would find it very informative. In the past issues NAPS has had seven articles.

A handbook has been developed to aid the Regional Directors in formulating plans and programs. The following pertinent information is included:

Introduction and history of NAPS, our Mission Statement, legal documentation and policies, chapters on Church ownership of the Scout Units and Bible based materials, religious awards, instructions for members to work with Churches to start new units, materials for Chaplain's Aide, Covenant relationship with Presbyteries, the organizational structure and responsibilities of NAPS, operational procedures and a list of available materials.


Also included are three tables: Job description for Youth Ministry Staff, National Executive Committee and National Officers and their job descriptions.

A training session was held at Philmont in July this year for the officers and members. It provided information on NAPS relationship with Presbyteries and getting the word out about NAPS. Emphasis was made regarding the promotion of PRAY God and Country programs and techniques of building NAPS at the local levels. Plans are in the making for a NAPS Breakout Session at the Religious Relations Week at Philmont in July 2003.

Regional News

Northeast Region

Eugene Foley - Director (856) 964-3184



NAPS will be represented at the Twentieth World Jamboree by our own Eugene Foley whose duties will include Religious and Spiritual Activities as a member of the International Service Team. Foley has been Chaplain Coordinator at Philmont, Chaplain at the Florida Sea Base and National Jamboree Staff assisting in the NAPS booth where tens of thousands of youth and leaders are given a chance to meet NAPS officers and volunteers.

Special thanks goes out to Fran & Artie Falk for their work in New York. Long-time volunteers for Presbyterian Scouting, the Falks have made significant contributions in their organizing efforts. As important as the work they do locally, their initiative has helped to set a standard and example for other volunteers. All volunteers are strongly encouraged to share their experiences with NAPS so that we all may learn and benefit from the successful (and even the not so successful) efforts at making Scouting stronger for our future leaders.

Artie and Fran Falk - Secretary (718) 479-9541

At the 1997 National Jamboree, Artie and Fran Falk became excited about the things that Scouting was doing for youth. They talked to people in the NAPS booth and found the things we are doing at the National level they could do at the local level. They have worked to build the Queens Ecumenical Religious Relation Group into a very significant force giving out over 80 medals last year at a banquet honoring the youth who have completed their age appropriate materials in the God and Country program. They have sent letters to all churches in two of the Presbyteries offering assistance in starting a Scout Unit. They have one new Scout unit and are working on others. Mid-Atlantic Region

The Mid-Atlantic Region welcomes Steve Smith as its new Director, just in time for the new year. Steve lives in Whiteville, North Carolina and is both an Elder and a Deacon in the First Presbyterian Church (USA) of Whiteville and owns his own business, Interim health Care. In addition to having been the church treasurer he also recently co-chaired their Strategic Planning Committee. He has a 15-year old daughter and a 17-year old Eagle Scout son who will be the Eagle Class Spokesman at the 2003 Cape Fear Council Annual Banquet. Steve has been a Cubmaster, Webelos Den Leader, Assistant Scoutmaster, and is now the Troop Committee Advancement Chairman. Not content to remain solely in North Carolina both he and his son attended the 1997 National Jamboree, the 1998 World Jamboree in Chile, Florida Sea Base, and participated in a Philmont Trek in 2000. He has attended the Philmont Training Center, National Camp School, Wood Badge, and is a member of the Order of the Arrow. He was his council's first Webelos Resident Camp director and co-chaired the 1996 *Together Again* council-wide camporee for Cub and Boy Scouts. In 2000 he was chosen as the Logistics Chair for the 5,000 Cub and Boy Scout council-wide camporee. He the recipient of the Cape Fear Council District Award and was awarded the Silver Beaver in 2000.

South Atlantic Region

Neal had previously been a Field Director with the Atlanta Area Council responsible for the Council Religious Relationships Committee as well as a District Executive with the Coastal Empire Council in Savannah, GA. Neal has also been a Deacon and an Elder in the church. Jay Ruton has joined the regional committee. Jay has been extremely active in Scouting programs for more than 32 years and has held a number of Presbyterian Church lay positions over the years.

The Region is currently looking for a Regional Chaplain in order to complete its officers. Additionally, the Region is advocating the organization of new units chartered to Presbyterian churches, recruiting new youth members, earning the National Quality Unit Award, and increasing the number of youth religious emblems earned.

Trinity Region

Isabell Helmrich has been the Director for many years and is retiring We really appreciate her dedicated service. However, se will continue to help NAPS by being the contact to Presbytery where she developed a covenant relationship.

Our new Director for Trinity Region is David Gingras. David is a Life member of NAPS who previously served as NAPS Treasurer and Northeast Region NAPS President. He is a member of the Northeast Region Relationships Committee and presently serves as the Bronx Council Commissioner. Previously he was the Manhattan Council President and served on the Executive Board of the Greater New York Councils (GNYC). He is an Eagle Scout with six Palms and has two Eagle Scout sons. He has served in Special Guest Reception at the last four National Jamborees and was on the International Service Team (IST) at the World Jamboree in Chile. He is a Colonel in the New York Guard and served on active duty last year for the Response and Recovery phases of the World Trade Center incident.

He is a recipient of the Silver Beaver, Silver Antelope, God and Country, God and Service, Whitney Young, Spurgeon, James E. West and Shofar Awards. He is employed by Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) in Philadelphia. He attends Swarthmore Presbyterian Church in Swarthmore, PA.

Mid-America Region

Mike Cheeseman – Director (316) 634-1566

Mike has continued promoting the Scouting program among a community of divided Scouters and with a shrinking group of volunteers. The answer to these numerous concerns, for us, has been in the training of Chartered Organizational Representatives (CORs). This group, as you can guess, is not always comprised of registered Scouters. To make a long story short, they leaped the bounds of Scouting in some cases in the interests of promoting the God and Country Program. For example, they have encouraged Scouts to earn the God and Country Award, but at the same time this was a small fraction of the church group earning the award. To put it another way, they have sought out God and Country candidates, but not always in the usual places. Currently, three Korean Churches in Wichita are now working with the God and Country Program; the Korean Methodist Church, the Korean Baptist Church, and the Korean Presbyterian Church. The Korean Presbyterian Church Youth Group has recently completed the God and Country Program. Out of 20 candidates, only two were registered with BSA and two registered with GSA. As a NAPS representative, Mike sees this as a victory for Scouting, as well as a victory for the other candidates who were included.

Wray Johanning – Secretary (636) 391-0734

Recently Troop 260 had its first Court of Honor. In the grand scheme of things, it was a modest affair. But Wray had seven proud young men and beaming parents. Wray continues: "It makes

me humble to consider I was a part of the unit for a year, and it was my baby." Wray is currently serving as Active District Commissioner and Vice Chairman of a new District.
