Philmont Training

Philmont was very enjoyable and invigorating again this year. The weather was cool and scenery beautiful. The "Scouting in the Church's Ministry" course was attended by 27 people this year which is a smaller group than usually attends. The course is for of people from different denominations that do not have enough attendees to have their own week like the Catholics and Methodists. The program



was well staffed and provided information very useful in Scouting. These presentations included integrating of BSA programs with Church goals and existing programs, what Scouting can do for a congregation, BSA policies and public relations, to mention a few.

Two Presbyterian special sessions conducted by NAPS were held on Tuesday and Thursday afternoons. The first centered on our mission - "Develop Scouting in the Presbyterian Church to teach and recognize religious values". The NAPS handbook was used for reference material for our methods of accomplishing our mission, our policies and our organizational structure. The second session was centered on things of particular interest to NAPS members, and although it was a small group of Presbyterians, all have been very active in Scouting and the "Youth Religious Growth Program", so it was a very enjoyable interchange of ideas.

In <u>2004</u> NAPS plans to participate in two training sessions at Philmont: "*Scouting in Church Ministry*", scheduled for 11-17 July and "*Course for Presbyterian Leaders and Educators*", scheduled in the fall for October 4 to 8.

For 2004, Philmont and the other high adventure bases need Chaplains. Remember that as a Chaplain you will receive a stipend, have a nice brick duplex apartment and board provided for you and family. Chaplains will also have the opportunity to go in the back country with a 4 wheel drive vehicle, unless you do not want to - they are flexible as the seven different job assignments are rotated each week. An important part of the staff is a group of Philmont Chaplains, Protestant, Roman Catholic, Jewish, and Mormon, who serve God as they serve their neighbors who come to visit Philmont. I had the privilege of serving as a Philmont Chaplain during the summer of 2000 (the greatest summer job ever) while I was a student at Princeton Theological Seminary and I dropped in for a week this past summer (the best vacation imaginable). What a joy it is to see the growth in leadership and stature of today's youth, to lead in worship under the bluest sky, and to meet people from all over the country (and world!). It is always an honor to serve with experienced clergy from other backgrounds and faiths as well, to work as a team and to learn from one another. During the summer of 2003, for the first time in Philmont's grand history, all three Protestant Chaplains were from the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Scott Worsham, Rusty Cowden, and I were able to serve together for a week. I give thanks to God for blessing me in God's country and while I now serve in a church far away from Philmont, I want to go back whenever I can.

Philmont Recollections

This past summer I had the chance to spend sixteen days as one of three protestant chaplains at Philmont Scout Ranch. This was the first time in many years that I was able to spend so much time at the ranch. I have made several trips as a participant or faculty at

the Philmont Training Center, but I hadn't worked as a chaplain since I spent the summers of '87, '90, and 94.

This trip was especially sweet since two of my sons were also on staff, Bucko as a program counselor at Crater Lake camp, and Dan on the cabin restoration crew. Dan worked variously at Ponil, Bonita Cow Camp, and Fish Camp. This was their second and third summers as staff, and (counting the three summers they spent as kids) their fifth and sixth summers on the ranch.

I checked in about 10:30 on July 31st, thinking that my duties would not start until the next day. There was a need for a trip to North country though, so I borrowed a suburban (the chaplains have two vehicles for three chaplains) and by 1:30 I was at Copper Park, picking up an injured camper. This pace continued. I didn't take a day off, since days there are too precious to waste. On August 15th I was supposed to leave by noon, but there was a need for three chaplains (long story) at Clark's Fork, so Elder Wilson, Father Bob Hummel, and I spent our mornings dealing with that situation. I left Philmont only four and a half hours late. Not bad for Phil-time.

Many changes have been implemented since I was last a staffer. To me they seem pretty much changes for the better. One of the things I like best about this operation is that although they know they are the best (and they are), they never stop trying to be better. For one week of our time, all three protestant chaplains were Presbyterians, which was perhaps unique in Philmont's history. In any case it added to the fun.

The Need for Camp Chaplains

I recently received a note from a lady in the Austin, Texas area wondering if there was any possibility that NAPS might be able to help fund the salary of a chaplain for the local Scout camp for the coming summer. I received an e-mail written by the Reverend Dr. George Hupp of Cincinnati (and also our NAPS Vice President) that said that the Protestant Church Committee successfully raises funds for camp chaplains by soliciting local congregations. Whether you find volunteers from among your local ministers, from seminary students, or choose to have a paid religious staff at camp, I encourage you to support the placement of chaplains at all levels of summer camping. Just imagine what the exposure might generate!
